Learning Intentions

- Children recap learning about their body including sexual organs/genitals.
- Children recap learning about puberty and physical and emotional changes.
- Children are given basic knowledge about having sex (intercourse). This supports other RSHP learning.
- This activity places sex as part of adult relationships which are characterised by kindness, love and intimacy.
- The activity corrects what children at this young age may have learned by being exposed to media representations of sex, including pornography.
- The age of consent is introduced.

Success Criteria

- I can name the private parts of my body.
- I can talk about how puberty results in physical and emotional changes.
- I can describe what sex/sexual intercourse can involve.
- I understand that sex is something adults do in a relationship.

NOTE: This learning activity should be preceded by **My Body**, which covers names for parts of the body and puberty. This activity is an opportunity to refresh/review learning from that work on puberty and body changes. It would also support/enhance learning if delivered in advance of/alongside **How human life begins, pregnancy and birth**. If delivered together the review of puberty in both lessons might not be necessary. Some children may ask very direct questions. The guiding FAQs provided as an appendix can help with this. Some children may see marriage as a prerequisite to sex. This can be acknowledged through discussion.

Activity

- 1. RSHP learning is enhanced if children can sit together. *Introduce the activity along these lines*: Explain that today we are going to be talking about how people have sex, that this is important because as part of learning about health and wellbeing we need to understand our bodies and that for grown-ups having sex can be a part of a relationship with someone they care about. Explain that some people might feel embarrassed or a bit giggly, and this is ok. Today however, we will find out some facts and make sure everyone understands about sex.
- 2. **Recapping body parts**: Start the conversation by explaining that it is helpful to remember the names of parts of our body, that they have talked about this before. Share the slide with the image of woman and man with body parts named, refresh the terms with the children. Acknowledge (as you have before) that the children might use other names for the private parts of their body and that in class we try to remember to use these names.

3. Recapping puberty:

Remind the children that their body will change as they grown up and go through puberty. Share the slide and have some discussion (with shoulder partners first) about what the children remember:

Puberty: What happens to... Hair/Skin/Body shape/Breasts/Voices/Smell?

The children will likely remember but, if necessary, prompt with information that the vulva and penis/testes and other aspects of bodies change when people go through puberty. Stress that every penis, vulva, breasts and body are all different and that's ok. Remind the children that if they ever have a question or a worry about growing up and body changes, they can speak to you or an adult they trust.

4. The next slide also asks: When we go through puberty what happens to our feelings and emotions?

Ask: Do you remember how we spoke about feelings changing with puberty? Ask children to work with a shoulder partner to remember previous discussion and learning, bring back for some feedback. What did we learn? Reiterate that:

- Emotions can be felt very strongly and change quickly.
- Some people have crushes/fancy/are attracted to other people.
- When they are older some people have boyfriends and girlfriends.
- 5. Explain that when they grow up, when they are adults, they might fall in love with someone. Use the slide/ask: How does a person show love for someone? (The children may draw on learning from activities at the level Love and Relationships if they have done them). The children could talk in pairs or as one group. As the children respond, reflect back on their examples (if they don't already use these words) with acknowledgement that what they are suggesting can also be thought of as *being kind* or *caring* or *trusting*. (Perhaps you have been reading a book or using other material in class where it would be useful to reflect on close/loving relationships).

6. Explain that when adults trust each other and love or like each other very much, they might decide to have sex, that sex is something that adults do. Use the slides/read one point at a time and check understanding, encouraging comments or questions.

What is sex?

- 1. You must be 16 years or older to have sex.
- 2. Sex is something that adults can do when they love and care for each other. Sometimes people talk about 'making love'.
- 3. When a couple want to have sex, they will go to a private place like their bedroom. They will kiss and cuddle and touch each other's bodies. They will touch the private parts of each other's bodies.
- 4. When the couple are two men, we say they are gay. When a couple are two women, we say they are gay or lesbian. If the couple is a man and a woman, we say they are heterosexual or straight.
- 5. Sex should feel nice. Adults learn what they like and don't like.
- 6. When a man feels like he wants to have sex with his partner his penis will get hard, this is called an erection.
- 7. When a woman feels like she wants to have sex with her partner her vulva and vagina might feel tingly and wet or slippery to touch.
- 8. If a man and a woman are having sex, and they both want to do it, the man can put his penis inside a woman's vagina and gently move his penis in and out. This should feel nice for both people.
- 9. When people have sex, they might have an orgasm. For a woman an orgasm is a pleasurable feeling in her body. For a man, if he has an orgasm (called ejaculation) a white liquid called semen will come out of his hard penis. He will enjoy this feeling.
- 10. If a man has an orgasm (ejaculates) when his penis is inside the woman's vagina, then the sperm may meet the egg, and this is the way a woman can get pregnant and have a baby.
- 7. Why do adults have sex? Ask the pupils: So, this is what sex is, why do you think adults have sex? If prompts are needed: Some people might want to have sex to feel closer to each other, to show each other love, or because it feels nice. A man and a woman can have sex to make a baby.
- 8. Any questions? End with an acknowledgement that there might be more questions that children would like to ask. Are there any now? Set up and explain that there is a 'question box' available so that if the children have a question about today's lesson, they can write it on a piece of paper, and you will read it later. If they want to, they can put their name on it, they don't have to. (In terms of follow up this can be with the full class/group, or with one child if they do give their name with a question. Spending time on questions from the box (even when you think this has already been covered in the lesson) gives an opportunity to reinforce key learning and messages and acknowledges your interest in the child's curiosity.
- **9.** If you have books from the recommended reading lists in the class library share these and encourage children to read them in class.

Connecting with home

Practitioner Notes

The text below could be used to communicate with home about this activity.

As part of our learning about relationships, sexual health and parenthood, we will be exploring what sex is. At this age children are often curious, they may have heard or seen things that mean they have questions. We want to give the children good, basic knowledge. This lesson will encourage children to understand that adult sexual relationships should be based on trust, love, consent, and intimacy. In other learning the children will also learn about how human life begins - conception, though pregnancy, to birth. The children will have an opportunity to ask questions within the class, as well as a questions box to ask any questions they may want to ask individually. We like these books which have some good information for children at this age about their changing bodies, sex, and relationships, they might also help learning at home:

Frequently Asked Questions and Suggested Answers

These are some of the questions that pupils may ask. Remember it is ok to say you're not sure how to answer a question, but you will think about it and answer it later, this might also be because you want to do this individually with a child. These are only suggestions for frequently asked questions and answers, as teacher/educator you know the children well and can respond in ways you know they will understand.

Q: How does a woman know she is pregnant?

A: A woman can take a pregnancy test or go to her doctor and ask her doctor to check.

Q: How do two women (lesbians) have sex? How do two men (gay men) have sex?

A: Everyone has sex in different ways, but just like a male and a female, sex can include kissing each other, kissing and touching each other's bodies and private parts (penis and vulva).



Q: Do you have to have babies?

A: You don't have to have children if you don't want to.

Q: Can you have sex if you don't want a baby?

A: Yes, you can. You can use something called contraception or condoms which you will learn about in another lesson.

Q: Can old people have babies?

A: When a woman gets to a certain age she is not able to have a baby anymore. This is called the menopause.

Q: What is an abortion?

A: If a woman gets pregnant and doesn't want to be anymore she can get an abortion. Another word for an abortion is a termination. A doctor or nurse will give some medicine to end the pregnancy.

Q: Do girls get erections?

A: Girls don't get erections because they don't have penises.

Q: Does sex hurt?

A: Sex shouldn't hurt. Sex should feel nice.

Q: What is a virgin?

A: A virgin is a person who hasn't had sex yet.

Q: Is sex "gross"?

A: Sex is a normal part of a relationship when you are an adult and is natural. Sex isn't gross.

Q: Have you had sex?

A: Some things are very private to a person. Sex is a private thing, and it's not okay to ask that question of someone.

Q: Can a male and a male have a baby? Can a female and a female have a baby?

A: A male and a male or a female and a female cannot make a baby. But they can adopt a baby and be just as good at raising a baby. We will be talking and learning more about how babies are made in another lesson.

Q: What is porn/pornography?

A: Porn is short for pornography. Pornography is sexual images or videos. You must be 18 to watch pornography. If you ever see things about sex that make you upset or have some questions, you can speak to me.

Q: What is rape?

A: Rape is when a person does not consent/give permission to have sex, but someone forces them to do sexual things. This is illegal.
